House Bill 509 focuses on Tuition Assistance for Military Students, House Bill 43.73 for upgrades to the college's utilities infrastructure, and House Bill 3683 for the complete renovation of our Engineering Building on the Niceville Campus. Northwest Florida State College Exceeds \$2 Million Energy Savings

By implementing an innovative energy conservation program, Northwest Florida State College has significantly cut energy use — saving \$2,037,621 in only three years.

The focus on conservation reflects NWF State College's partnership with Cenergistic, a national firm that helps clients to plan and implement a comprehensive energy program focusing on the best practices for using energy. These best practices typically result in 20 – 30 percent savings. Savings are

to have been introduced on behalf of our college in almost a decade.

I want to take a moment to discuss the Military Assistance bill. NWF State College is proposing a change to Florida State Statute 1009.23 that would allow our college to waive mandatory fees for military students. Military Tuition Assistance (TA) is a benefit paid to eligible members of the Army, Navy, Marines, Air Force, and Coast Guard. In 2014, the Department of Defense made a change to the TA program which excludes the payment of fees, including all expenses not labeled as tuition. This separation of “fees” and “tuition” has greatly reduced our ability to serve our military as state statute ties mandatory fees to tuition. As you can see, this is a challenge to NWF’s military-friendly reputation and a barrier that we must overcome. I want to personally thank Representative Ponder for his strong commitment to leading this legislation.

We appreciate the work of all our Northwest Florida state legislators and their staff members to introduce these bills and to shepherd them through the legislative process. Our local legislators realize the partnerships, promise, possibilities, and potential for our college and the communities that we serve; and they are stepping up for us in Tallahassee.

What does this all mean? It means that it doesn’t matter who gets the credit for the work or who “seals the deal.” What matters is that we forge these crucial partnerships with all members of Northwest Florida in order to reach our goals and a bright future for our college and its students and the region we serve.

The best way to predict our future is to create it. I pledge to you that I will be at the table working with others in creating promise and leading progress in our region. We are listening to the needs of our community and our students, and we are positioning ourselves to be proactive problem-solvers to any challenge.

Together we are excellent. Apart we are mediocre. We are creating community partnerships to increase synergy for progress in Northwest Florida. Will you join us? ■

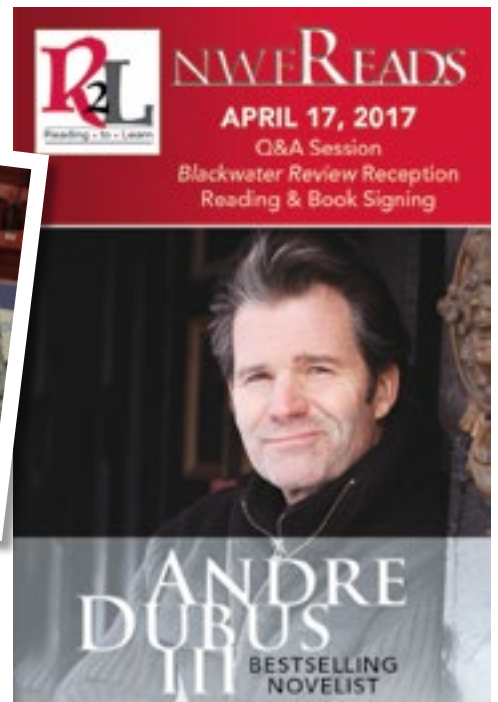
IN THE SPOTLIGHT

NWF STATE COLLEGE NURSING PROGRAM RANKED IN FLORIDA'S TOP 20



The Northwest Florida State College Nursing Program was recently ranked as one of the top 20 associate of science (A.S.) in nursing programs in Florida by RegisteredNursing.org.

This designation is awarded to programs based on an analysis of past and present pass rates of the NCLEX-RN, a national exam used to assess competency of registered nursing students that is required for licensure.

"One of the most important measures used to evaluate the quality of a nursing program is the first-time pass rates of its graduates on the NCLEX exam," said Dr. Marty Walker, Director of the NWF Nursing program. "Our Nursing department is proud to share that the A.S. program's first-time pass rate reported by the Florida Board of Nursing (FBN) on the NCLEX exam is 94.44 percent for 2016. This number is well above the national pass rate for AS programs of 81.68 percent." The state of Florida has over 130 associate of science in nursing programs of which RegisteredNursing.org ranked the top 50 by percentage of graduates who pass the exam. The nursing program at NWF was ranked 13. ■

GLITTER Grant Received

The Costa Leadership Institute received a \$2,500 grant from the Foundation of the Fabrication and Manufacture Association to support a high school girls manufacturing camp this summer called Girls Learning Industrial Trades To Empower & Redefine (GLITTER). This program is intended to introduce females to these industries.
