Course Description:

This course introduces students to rhetorical concepts and audience-centered approaches to writing including composing processes, language conventions and style, and critical analysis and engagement with written texts and other forms of communication.

Goals:

Students will develop competency in expository and argumentative writing.

Objectives:

Student Learning Outcomes: • Students will apply rhetorical knowledge to communicate for a range of audiences and purposes. • Students will employ critical thinking to analyze forms of communication. • Students will engage in writing processes that involve drafting, revising, and reflecting.

Student Expectations of the Course:

The instructor will be available outside of class to answer questions. Students should expect to be challenged in their work to successfully complete assignments.
