COURSE DESCRIPTION

THIS COURSE INTRODUCES STUDENTS TO RHETORICAL CONCEPTS AND AUDIENCE-CENTERED APPROACHES TO WRITING INCLUDING COMPOSING PROCESSES, LANGUAGE CONVENTIONS AND STYLE, AND CRITICAL ANALYSIS AND ENGAGEMENT WITH WRITTEN TEXTS AND OTHER FORMS OF COMMUNICATION. LEARNING OUTCOMES: • STUDENTS WILL APPLY RHETORICAL KNOWLEDGE TO COMMUNICATE FOR A RANGE OF AUDIENCES AND PURPOSES. • STUDENTS WILL EMPLOY CRITICAL THINKING TO ANALYZE FORMS OF COMMUNICATION. • STUDENTS WILL ENGAGE IN WRITING PROCESSES THAT INVOLVE DRAFTING, REVISING, AND REFLECTING.

Goals: Students will develop competency in expository and argumentative writing.
