Quizzes (50% total) You will have three chapter quizzes in this course. The quizzes reflect information in your assigned chapter readings. On the exams, questions reflect specific topics in the field of general psychology. The exams will also provide opportunities to show what you

have learned about research and theories presented within each topic. Through weekly news announcements, students will be notified when quizzes are open and dates of closing.

Critical thinking exercises (40%) You will have several critical thinking exercises in this class. The goal of each exercise is to help you develop critical thinking skills and improve your ability to synthesize information in general psychology. Additional details for each exercise will be provided through weekly news announcements.

Participation in Canvas discussions (10%) I will post questions to the canvas modules folder located in your course. Each student will post one response to each question posted. Through weekly news announcements, I will notify students when discussion questions are posted. Questions will reflect specific topics covered in the field of general psychology.
