COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course introduces students to rhetorical concepts and audience-centered approaches to writing including composing processes, language conventions and style, and critical analysis and engagement with written texts and other forms of communication.

COURSE GOALS

1. Students will learn how to analyze an argument and break down the types of appeals being made as well as how effective those appeals are for the intended audience.
 - Students will be able to identify ethos, logos, and pathos

- Analyze how these appeals and Kairos are used by other rhetors to make arguments and measure the success of those uses
- Identify the intended audience and the appeals that are most effective for that group
- 2. Students will be able to complete research using various sources such as databases and newspapers
 - Utilize available resources to effectively build evidence
 - Be able to effectively navigate the databases
 - Identify the difference between scholarly and popular sources
- 3. Students will be able to go through multiple stages of drafting and revising.
 - Develop a thesis and outline
 - Complete multiple drafts based on peer and instructor feedback
 - Complete brainstorming exercise to develop ideas and arguments
- 4. Students will be able to reformat an argument for a new audience and medium
 - Analyze different audience needs and desires
 - Analyze the limitations and affordances of various mediums
 - Repurpose an academic argument paper for a public audience via a spoken medium
