COURSE DESCRIPTION

English Composition I, ENC1101, 3 credit hours.

This course introduces students to rhetorical concepts and audience-centered approaches to writing including composing processes, language conventions and style, and critical analysis and engagement with written texts and other forms of communication.

COURSE-LEVEL STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

1. Students will apply rhetorical knowledge to communicate for a range of audiences and purposes.
2. Students will employ critical thinking to analyze forms of communication.
3. Students will engage in writing processes that involve drafting, revising, and reflecting.

COURSE PREREQUISITES

A passing score on the standardized placement test measuring communications/verbal/reading achievement, successful completion of any required developmental English and Reading coursework with a grade of C or better, or exemption from placement testing.

Assignments

The content in College classes is designed to offer you a challenging, growing experience in each class. The class experience may include content that is more mature, wide-ranging, or different from that which is offered in a high school classroom. You may be introduced to theories, topics, materials, discussions, or ideas that are different from those you have encountered before or that you do not agree with; you will not at any time be forced to espouse, believe, or agree with any subject matter even if you interact with or are required to complete assignments involving that subject matter in class.

Some of our reading selections may contain concepts you may find challenging; please note that exposure to new concepts is part of a college education but does not mean you are expected to agree with them. These selections merit our attention because of rhetorical strategies you will be using in your own essays. Please do not conclude that the College or this professor endorses these ideas. Feel free to speak with the professor to address any questions or concerns.

Discussion with your peers in this class should follow the principles of courtesy, tolerance of diverse opinions, and thoughtful grounding in the course materials.

There are three categories of class assignments (see below). All assignments are due at 11:59 p.m. on Sundays unless otherwise noted; large or team projects may have other, internal deadlines in addition to the final submission.

I grade the assignment submitted; I do not regrade because students submitted the wrong version. You can open the file to check it before final submission, and you will get a digital receipt when you successfully submit a paper. If you have trouble, email the assignments to the professor before the deadline, with screenshots of any error messages. I will help you successfully submit your work using the appropriate software. Without these measures, work cannot be accepted late. Please note that I cannot grade assignments unless /they are submitted via appropriate software/website.

I will help you successfully submit your work using the appropriate software. Without these measures, work cannot be accepted late/beyond the grace period and will earn the appropriate penalty. Please note that I cannot accept assignments for grading unless they are submitted via appropriate software, as emailed assignments are too easy to lose track of.

Please note that if you have an extreme, unforeseen, and extenuating circumstance that you hope will result in suspension of the stated policy on late work (see above), I must ask you to provide documentation of this circumstance to help me make a decision in your case. This request does not mean that I do not believe you; it simply ensures that the playing field in this class is equitable for all students and extra time on an assignment has verified, documented justification.

At the discretion of the instructor, an incomplete final course grade ("I") may be awarded when the student is unable to finish the required work because of unforeseen, serious, and extenuating circumstances such as illness or TDY assignment. To receive an "I" grade, the student must have successfully completed a significant portion of the required coursework and be able to finish the remaining work independently, without attending class. An "I" grade will automatically convert to a grade of "F" if the student does not complete the remainder of the coursework by the established deadline.

CLASS POLICIES

How to succeed:

- For assistance with the course content and your writing, please rely only on college tutors or the professor; **do not use family, friends, or others.** Not only may they not be the best source of help, but I need to grade your work, not your mother's, for example.
- Please note that you will not be able to complete all assignments on your mobile device; furthermore, you must use Chrome as your browser in order to see all elements of this course.
- Students should not rely only on the Canvas calendar or the "Coming Up" list of due dates on the Canvas dashboard for deadlines but should log on to the course content weekly and thoroughly review all assignments and resources in the modules.
- Always check the Canvas modules; work and deadlines provided there supersede the tentative schedule. At the beginning of each week, consult the Canvas modules for any assignments (given in each module's folder) or other announcements. You will be notified in advance via Canvas of any changes.
- Please note that I grade the file you submit. If you submit the wrong version of an assignment, please don't expect that that I will grade that file also. Unfortunately, time does not allow this. Furthermore, the college is committed to preparing its graduates to succeed in their employment, and checking one's work before submitting it to a supervisor is essential, so this policy helps reinforce university/business/industry expectations. If you realize your mistake before I grade your work, you can submit the correct version; I'm happy to grade the most recent file you submit before I grade.
- This course prepares you for professional communication, so all of our communication should follow professional standards.

Academic integrity:

- **Plagiarism, cheating, presenting text generated by artificial intelligence as one's own, or any other form of academic dishonesty is a serious breach of student responsibilities and may trigger consequences which range from a failing grade to formal disciplinary action. Any use of artificial intelligence must align with the policies provided in the Canvas course shell. If I am confident that a student has violated academic integrity standards, please note that I am required to report this incident to the college administration.**
- This class uses software to indicate content that may be generated by **artificial intelligence (AI)**. Please note that by enrolling in this class, you accept that such software will be used to flag possible instances of AI-generated text that students present as their own original work—such presentation is a violation of academic integrity and will earn a zero, as will any instance of cheating. If a student whose work is flagged as substantially created by AI claims original authorship, the subsequent validation of the student's claim will include, but will not be limited to, a timed writing, proctored in the Niceville Testing Center, to establish writing voice and style; these are unique to each writer, so the timed writing will be compared to the work in question and will help to determine authorship.
- All work in this course is individual and must be your own except for possible assigned team projects. While you are encouraged to study together, you must complete all assignments yourself unless otherwise instructed.
- For team assignments, if these are assigned, it is essential that you work with your teammates, including helping them with their contributions to the final product. Failure to do so will lower the grade you earn and may result in a zero. If you no longer participate with a team because you have not met participation requirements, you may not use that team's work in your own submission.

Technical issues:

- If Canvas servers go down, deadlines will be extended. However, problems with student computers or Internet service providers will not result in extended deadlines; please submit work early to avoid losing points because of technology issues.
- **If you experience technology issues preventing timely submission of assignments, email the assignments to the professor before the deadline, with screenshots of any error messages. - I will provide feedback on paper outlines via a class assignment, but please note that I cannot provide email feedback on papers before you submit them for grading; this medium is ineffective and inefficient. I am happy to provide feedback on drafts during class, during office hours over the phone, via Zoom, or in-person office hours. Northwest Florida State College subscribes to Turnitin, an online plagiarism detection and prevention service. Papers submitted to Turnitin may be saved as source documents within these databases to detect plagiarism in other papers. Please note: All assignments submitted in this course are analyzed for plagiarism, originality, and AI content.

Students are responsible for ensuring that papers are successfully submitted to Turnitin. You can check the file you submit before finalizing submission, and you will receive a confirmation email when the submission process has been completed. If you do not receive this email from Turnitin, please immediately resubmit the assignment. Please note that failure to do so will not automatically result in a due date extension.

In addition, this class uses software to indicate content that may be generated by **artificial intelligence (AI)**. Please note that by enrolling in this class, you accept that such software will be used to flag possible instances of AI-generated text that students present as their own original work—such presentation is a violation of academic integrity and will earn a zero, as will any instance of cheating. If a student whose work is flagged as substantially created by AI claims original authorship, the subsequent validation of the student's claim will include, but will not be limited to, a timed writing, proctored in the Niceville Testing Center, to establish writing voice and style; these are unique to each writer, so the timed writing will be compared to the work in question and will help to determine authorship.

Please note that Grammarly and similar software use generative AI to improve writing style and voice. Using Grammarly or a comparable tool to check your grammar and punctuation is acceptable; using it to generate text or refine your style and voice is not. One of the goals of a writing class is to improve *your* writing style, not to see if you can push a button and let software do that work. **If you use Grammarly or similar software to improve your style and voice, you are using AI in a prohibited manner. You are responsible for turning off the AI component in this software;** in most cases, this can be accomplished in Account Settings.

In this class, you will have the opportunity to learn about and to practice ethical uses of generative AI.

Writing/work that is not the student's own and lacks appropriate documentation of sources will earn a zero.

This course supervises exams through an online proctoring tool that will monitor you while completing course assessments. Northwest Florida State College authorizes the use of approved online proctoring solutions, such as Respondus, to promote academic integrity. These solutions have been approved by NWFSC Academic Affairs and NWFSC IT to be used in course assessments. The Respondus solution may monitor assessments by a variety of means, such as but not limited to, viewing and recording through your computer's webcam, monitoring for noise in the room through your computer's microphone and speaker system, monitoring for other internet usage while taking the assessment, and recording keystroke and visual images. The College has authorized these approved online proctoring providers to perform this service for the purpose of maintaining academic integrity. Information gathered through the proctoring solution is used by the College to ensure academic integrity in testing and may result in a

complaint against you under the Academic Integrity Policy or Student Code of Conduct, should the College have reason to believe either policy has been violated. By registering for this course and maintaining your enrollment and not dropping the course prior to the add/drop deadline, you freely and voluntarily consent to the online proctoring requirement in this course.
