COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course introduces students to rhetorical concepts and audience-centered approaches to writing including composing processes, language conventions and style, and critical analysis and engagement with written texts and other forms of communication.

MAKE-UP WORK

1. **Grace Period:** Students are allowed a **two-day grace period** following the original due date of an assignment. During this period, no penalties will be applied.
2. **Late Submission Penalties:** After the two-day grace period, assignments submitted late will incur a penalty of **5 points per day** for each additional day until the assignment is submitted.
3. **Extension Requests:** Students who anticipate needing more time due to unforeseen circumstances are encouraged to email the instructor to request an extension. If an extension is granted, students will not incur any point deductions.
