In this course, students will learn the foundations of macroeconomics as the branch of economics concerned with how decision-making, in an environment of scarcity, maps onto the aggregate economy. Students will examine theories and evidence related to the following core set of topics: national income determination, money, monetary and fiscal policy, macroeconomic conditions, international trade and the balance of payments, and economic growth and development.

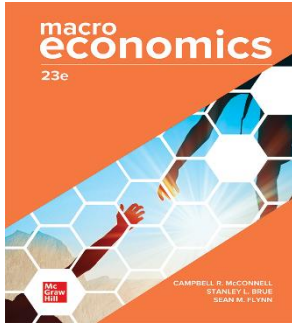
COURSE-LEVEL STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

ASSIGNMENTS, GRADES, AND PROCEDURES

GRADE COMPONENTS

Comprehensive Exams: this course includes comprehensive midterm and final exams. Each of these exams count for 15% of your grade, totaling a cumulative weight of 30% of your total grade. Tests will be administered strictly online using the Proctorio online proctoring application and will be open book/notes.

Other Exams: in addition to the midterm and final, this course also includes 2 standard exams that will cover specific chapters. Each of these exams count for 10% of your grade. As with the cumulative exams, tests will be administered online using the Proctorio online proctoring application and will be open book/notes.

McGraw Hill Connect Online Assignments: each week, there will be online graded assignments consisting of SmartBook assignments, Connect the Dots videos, and chapter quizzes. The overall average on each of these categories will count for 15% of your total grade (except Connect the Dots videos, which will count for 10%). The lowest grade in each of these assignment categories will be dropped. These assignments can be found on Canvas (via the McGraw Hill Connect application) and will be made available two weeks in advance of the due date.

Group Project: 10% of your course grade will be based upon a group project that will be completed in a group of 3 to 4 people. The groups will stay the same the entire semester and you may either choose your groupmates or have me assign you to a group.
